UCFS Fights for Accessible Dental Care

Dental care is a vital part of overall health, but it's often inaccessible to rural residents as well as uninsured or underinsured patients. UCFS Healthcare CEO Jennifer Granger has passionately advocated for improved access to dental care, including taking her concerns before the Connecticut Legislature. "The status quo is not sustainable, and intervention is needed," Granger concluded in a report highlighting the hurdles community health centers face in offering dental services. Despite these challenges, UCFS Healthcare is taking steps to make this care more accessible, including a renewed collaboration with the UConn School of Dentistry. We have hired three new dentists and reduced our waitlist by over 50 percent, enabling patients to more quickly receive the dental care they need.

How UCFS Eldercare is Helping Vulnerable Seniors

UCFS Eldercare has been providing seniors with housing at Sheltering Arms since 1877. In many cases, Sheltering Arms has welcomed seniors who were homeless for a variety of reasons, including unaffordable rent, financial extortion, or loss of income due to an extended hospitalization. We opened our doors to seniors who needed care due to the closing of local residential care facilities. Others have come to us from nursing homes to enjoy the more independent accommodations and integrated care that is available at Sheltering Arms. "We are a great option to help them," says Cary Trantalis, Vice President of Eldercare Services at UCFS. "Along with the nursing care, we also provide them with social support as well."

When the River Rose, We Rose to the Occasion

When the Yantic River flooded on January 10th, UCFS Healthcare stepped up for its patients. The flood caused extensive damage to the lower level of the Edward and Mary Lord Family Health Center in Norwich, leaving 58 behavioral health offices and group rooms unusable. Thanks to the operational efficiencies of UCFS Healthcare, we were able to seamlessly transition patients to telehealth appointments, or have them see healthcare providers at other UCFS Healthcare locations. "We really didn't miss a beat in regards to our patients and what we needed to provide," says Pam Kinder, Vice President of Business Development. Funding from the Edward and Mary Lord Foundation and other foundations allowed us to rebuild the affected spaces within months, with no negative financial impact to UCFS Healthcare.
